

'I'm glad to see those monkeys are still upside down,' said Mr Twit.



Friday Fact Fun

There are around 10000 different species of birds worldwide and they come in a variety of sizes, shapes and colours.	The food that birds eat can be very different, depending on where they live and what kind of food is around the area.		
They are usually able to get their prey by pecking it off the ground or a tree, but they also hunt by swooping down from a branch or the air and suddenly attacking.	Homing pigeons are bred to find their way home from long distances away and have been used for thousands of years to carry messages.		
Ostriches lay the largest eggs and has the fastest running speed of a maximum 97kph.	One of the biggest ways that birds are able to protect themselves from predators is by flying.		
Most birds like to eat fruit, plants, seeds, insects, and other small animals. Birds don't have any teeth, so their bodies are used to digesting their food whole.	Birds also protect themselves by living in family groups, called flocks, where they are able to watch out for each other and have more eyes to see predators.		
Some bird species are intelligent enough to create and use tools.	Around 20% of bird species migrate long distances every year.		
The chicken is the most common species of bird found in the world.	They are warm-blooded which means that their body stays the same temperature.		
Hummingbirds can fly backwards.	All birds have feathers and wings.		
The Bee Hummingbird is the smallest living bird in the world with a length of just 5cm.	Unlike humans, birds have hollow bones which help them fly as they are extremely light.		
Scientist believe that birds evolved from theropod dinosaurs.	Habitat Appearance		
Birds will bathe water or even go out when it is raining to clean their feathers. For birds that live in areas with little water, they will clean their feathers by giving themselves a dust bath.
